West Elementary BOE Report from Mrs. Flinn:

• West Staffing Changes for 2025-2026

Title I Teacher, Lisa Kruse will be returning to her hometown with her family. The Kruses have purchased a refurbished farmhouse and will be within seconds of her parents' farm. We are so sad to lose Mrs. Kruse from our school and district, but we are so excited for the opportunity for her children to grow up with grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins surrounding them.

Instructional Aide, Corey Reeves, has accepted a position as Events and Tourism Director for the Wamego City Chamber. He was approached about this position and we know he will be a tremendous asset to our community. Corey plans to finish out the school year in his current position as a Reading/Math Instructional Aide at West and will assume his new duties with the Chamber this summer. We have loved having Corey on staff with our team!

Fourth Grade Teacher, Robyn Logan, will be moving up to Fifth Grade next year. She is currently a Fourth Grade teacher at West. We will need six sections of Fifth Grade next year and we currently only have five sections. Robyn has a done wonderful job her first year of teaching and we know she will do equally as well in a Fifth Grade classroom.

Third Grade Teacher, Mason Meinhardt, will be moving up to Fourth Grade next year. We still need six sections of Fourth Grade, but only need five sections of Fifth Grade. Moving Miss Logan up a grade and Mrs. Meinhardt up a grade made the most sense to us in putting students first. The plan will be for both teachers to move back down to their current grade levels during the 2026-2027 school year, as long as they want to make the move back. During the 2026-2027 school year, it is anticipated that we will need six sections of every grade level at West.

• Kagan Cooperative Learning:

As a Kagan school, we are focusing on ensuring that all Kagan Cooperative Learning components are in place. Minimally, all teams are familiar with and have implemented the "Seven Keys for Success" of Kagan. These are reviewed regularly in PLC Teams. Our Kagan textbook is a GREAT resource to refer to regularly. PLC Teams are expected to take their Kagan texts with them to teaming each week to dig into the following areas:

 Structures - Currently, there are over 200 different Kagan Structures. Teachers are working to be fluent in multiple structures by the end of this year, but newly trained staff have been instructed to start small and use a couple in all parts of their lessons - (anticipatory set, checking for understanding, closure, etc.). They then move on to adding additional structures to make learning more engaging and fun! At a minimum, staff are expected to regularly use the "Essential 5" -RallyRobin, Timed Pair Share, RoundRobin, RallyCoach, and Stand Up/ Hand Up/Pair Up.

- *Teams* The creation of Kagan Teams follows the Kagan model. There are four types of teams that can be created in a classroom. All classrooms have their students sitting in cooperative teams and they are numbered 1-4 and A/B. <u>Rows of desks are NOT appropriate in a Kagan school</u>!
- Management Students in teams are all able to put their hands on the same piece of paper, able to comfortably orient themselves to each other, and have access to shared materials. Teachers have a shared signal to refocus teams quickly when they need to regain attention of their students.
- Class Building Class Building is used frequently and focuses on the Five Aims Getting Acquainted, Class Identity Building, Mutual Support, Valuing Differences, and Developing Synergy.
- **Team Building** Team Building is used at least twice per week. Again, the Five Aims listed above are followed.
- Social Skills Teachers emphasize social skills that students are developing during Kagan Structures. They also follow the Five Strategies for Fostering Social Skills Development - Structures & Structuring, Roles & Gambits, Modeling, Reinforcement, and Reflection & Planning.
- PIES (Basic Kagan Principles) Teachers follow the PIES basic Kagan Principles in their classrooms -Positive Interdependence, Individual Accountability, Equal Participation, and Simultaneous Interaction.

• Facilities Master Planning Committee:

A group of BOE members, admin and department heads met with Tucker Peddicord, owner of Lighthouse Construction Guidance, and BBN architects on **January 21** over the lunch hour. Tucker has been hired by the BOE to oversee long-range facilities planning for the district. We will be obtain input from our BLTs very soon, and would like for BLT members to represent the voices of their team members. The West BLT is scheduled to meet with Mr. Peddicord on Tuesday, February 11 at 3:40pm.

I have asked staff to consider "what challenges and opportunities" we have with our current reality. This is not a time to complain about things like what is not being cleaned to a teacher's satisfaction, or minor things that are not part of the "big picture". However, it is an opportunity to think about what we currently have, what we need, and what we would like to see happen in the future.

The items listed below were generated by Principal Amy Flinn:

- Drop Off/Pick Up Create a safer system for drop off and pick up. Separate buses and car riders. This could be a major infrastructure item that will need coordination and collaboration with the City of Wamego.
- *Heating/cooling system (HVAC)* On its last leg. Needs replaced.
- *Fixtures* Some areas need new toilets, sinks, tile, etc. Old and outdated.
- Classroom Sinks/water fountains/storage cabinets on the old side These are original to the building and are very old and outdated. Some don't even work properly anymore. One classroom does not have any running water and needs to have this.
- Doors on the old side of the building May need to be replaced. Do have asbestos internally in these doors, so this is quite expensive for disposal and replacement, but may be necessary at some point. NO, there is no danger to students/staff with the way they are now, but you should never nail anything into the doors!
- **Special Education spaces** Need to ensure we have adequate space for the needs of our Special Education students. Additional "quiet room"?
- **Natural Lighting** Would very much appreciate the opportunity to have some sort of natural lighting in the interior rooms without such at this time.

- *Recreational/Gym Space/Lunchroom Space* Would love to have an additional gym to allow for more recreational opportunities, as well as additional space to have more than one location for meal service.
- *Current Lunchroom* Dingy would like to brighten it up.
- **Storage** We have quite a bit of storage, but very little "accessible storage" for teachers. Classrooms have VERY limited storage due to their smaller size.
- STEM/Common Spaces for Grade Levels Would love to see "common" spaces for each grade level to engage in collaborative work, more science/STEM activities. Possibly add grade level storage in these areas?
- **Sound System** Our current sound system on the stage is the original and needs to be updated.
- *Stage Curtains* Shrunk when laundered after the "bat fiasco of 2007". Need replaced.
- **Stage Lighting** We do not have good stage lighting.
- Projection System in Gym/Recreation Space Would like to have a nice projection system with a large surface to project in our current gym or any new gym/recreational space for presentations/assemblies.

• Third Graders Explore Finding Area in Math

In several classes, students picked a character trait they wanted to embody in the coming New Year and set a standard for themselves and their school. • Fourth Grade Celebrates Kansas Day!

The Fourth Grade was overshadowed by the Christmas break blues UNTIL the bright spot known as Kansas Day invaded their classrooms. Each class was turned into a one room schoolhouse including full costumes and one room schoolhouse activities. Students made butter and even bread was baking in one classroom. Students participated in one room schoolhouse games, penmanship classes, spelling bees, arithmetic, and the reading of Kansas folktales. They were completely immersed in an 1800's experience jumping in the time machine to the time of their great grandparents or older! Students also created crafts relating to state flowers and birds to bring some color and to drop some knowledge out in the hallways.





• West Elementary Fourth Graders Celebrate Kansas Day with Pioneer-Themed Learning The Fourth Grade teachers at West Elementary School brought history to life as they celebrated Kansas's 164th birthday on Kansas Day. Dressed as pioneer school teachers, they encouraged students to step back in time by wearing traditional pioneer attire. Many students participated by wearing sunbonnets, pioneer dresses, flannel button-up shirts, suspenders, and overalls, adding to the immersive experience.

To guide the day's lessons, teachers used the *Rural School Days* Nearpod lesson provided by the Kansas Historical Society. This interactive program transported students to the historic one-room Stach School, where "Miss Drown," the schoolteacher, led lessons as they were taught in the 1920s. Through videos, historic photographs, and authentic textbook exercises, students engaged in reading, spelling, history, and penmanship just as children did over a century ago.

Adding a hands-on element to the day, students learned how to make homemade butter, which they enjoyed on fresh, homemade bread provided by their teachers. The activity was a delicious way to wrap up a day filled with learning and appreciation for Kansas history.

West Elementary's Fourth Grade students and teachers had a memorable Kansas Day, celebrating the state's rich history with engaging and interactive learning.

• Fifth Grade Studies Don Quixote in Explorers Unit for CKLA Language Arts

In the CKLA curriculum, Fifth Graders concluded their exploration of the fiction genre by delving into the classic novel "The Adventures of Don Quixote." Students focused on characters and plot, as well as on literary elements such as characterization, while reading a full-length adapted version of *Don Quixote*. CKLA continues to provide rigorous and meaningful learning experiences for our students.

• Fifth Grade Practices Patience with Kagan Structure

We practiced patience along with active listening by trying a new Kagan Structure called Match Mine. This was also a great way to end our space unit since we had to give directions just like the flight director in Apollo 13.

Students also continue to enjoy participating in the "Keep the Quote" activity where they allow a student to select a quote to guide their interactions with one another.

West's Reading Specialist, Abby Ross, has been attending a monthly Literacy Learner Cadre with several other literacy leaders in the district through Greenbush, our education service center.

The goal of the Literacy Learner Cadre is to increase knowledge and skill within Structured Literacy frameworks and principles of instruction to positively impact learner achievement. This time provides the opportunity to work in a collaborative professional community learning with other highly motivated educators.

• Central/West Site Council Update

Scott Meitler shared an update on the Early Learning project we are working on, and Amy Flinn and Shane Neel presented information on the USD 320 Strategic Plan and the building goals Central and West have set to support the Strategic Plan. • West Professional Development for February 17

West Elementary Staff will be busy with professional development on February 17. Part of our staff will be attending the final day of the 5 Day Kagan Cooperative Learning training. The remaining staff will be involved in the following professional development activities:

- Creating projects with <u>iPads</u> that take learning to a higher level. We have spent all of this money on the iPads, and we definitely do not believe in using them as "filler" for kids. We want to take the PD that has been provided to us by Kyle Pace from Apple Education and apply that at a higher level, but the teachers need time to dig into what he has taught us and find places in their curriculum where they could create projects that would make learning more meaningful than what we are currently doing.
- Working through <u>Behavior Interventions</u> We have spent all of this time as a BSEL team with TASN and have created a "Behavior Intervention Log", but we have not had the opportunity to look more closely at our data to streamline interventions. For example, are their common behaviors that we can identify that we could address through a more targeted behavior intervention? Who will implement these interventions? How will they be progress monitored? These and so many more questions need to be answered and plans need to be made.
- <u>EduClimber</u> There is SO much to eduClimber and our staff needs time to start learning more about how we can use this very useful (and expensive) data dashboard. The training modules take quite a bit of time. They will through some of these, with plans to complete this training in the spring or early fall.

• Specialized Team News for January 2025 <u>Art News from Mrs. Havice</u>:

During January, the students worked on flower, leaf, and stem designs for their artwork based on the work of Yayoi Kusama. We continued learning how to handle challenges with materials, mistakes, and how to pivot when plans need to be altered, all of which are very important life skills. The students worked with their table group members to discuss ways to transform a flower shape into something new, fresh, and creative with influences from the artist Yayoi Kusama. After brainstorming verbally, the students drew their ideas on a sheet of paper. Then the flower design pages were voted on by students to determine the most interesting designs that came from the brainstorming sessions. From there, the students selected their construction paper colors, flower, and leaf styles. They added additional designs with black pens and colorful polka dot stickers to give their items a boost of additional color.

Counselor News from Mrs. Butler:

During the month of January, the students began Unit 3: Empathy and Kindness in Second Step. During this unit, students will learn the importance of engaging in kind acts to help them develop empathy–

the ability to understand and feel how someone else is feeling. Third Grade students are learning how empathy and kindness help build friendships and how they can identify acts of kindness for others. The Fourth Grade students are focusing on learning how to ask questions to help understand another person's point of view. During Fifth Grade lessons, students are identifying a community problem and empathizing with those affected by looking at potential solutions.

Another project all the students are working on this month is creating a vision board. A vision board is a visual representation of their goals, hopes, and dreams now and in the future. All students identified personal and academic goals (short term and long term). The students also identified 2 or 3 careers that interest them. The remainder of their vision board will be filled with bucket list items. Finally, the students will create a digital vision board that will be posted on Xello when they are completed.

Explore News from Mrs. Hatfield and Mrs. Spearie:

After reading <u>The Word Collector</u> by Peter H Reynolds, we started exploring things students are looking forward to in 2025. They brainstormed a word of the year that would represent what they want to focus on. Through this activity, students got the chance to brush up on their dictionary skills and create a collage featuring their word of the year.

Library News from Mrs. Hatfield:

The Caldecott Medal is an award given each year to the most distinguished American artist of a picture book for children. Students used the award's selection criteria to evaluate several books as part of a Mock Caldecott in advance of the announcement of this year's award at the end of January.

In addition to the Caldecott we also celebrated the winners of the following awards, the Newberry Medal, Coretta Scott King Award, Pura Belpré Award, and the Siebert Award.

Music News from Mrs. Hermesch:

Sing! Sing! All classes have been doing a lot of singing this month.

Fifth Grade has been working on five songs that our honor choir participants will sing in Manhattan on February 1st. The students will perform them at their spring community tour in May.

Fourth Grade polished their concert music for a performance on January 21st. They did very well! The show was called "I Need a Vacation".

Third Grade is also polishing their concert music for a performance on February 11, 2025. The show is called "Swamped". They are looking forward to sharing their music with an audience.

We would like to welcome Kansas State University Student Intern, Ethan Karnes to West Elementary. He has been doing a wonderful job creating music with the students. He will begin teaching the kids as soon as their performances are over.

Physical Education News from Mrs. Ontjes:

In January, we kicked off the semester with some ultimate frisbee! The students first learn the proper way to throw and catch the frisbee, and then they had the chance to play an actual game of ultimate. To keep things interesting, we also introduced ultimate basketball, a fun twist on the classic game. It was so great to have the students back after the break and see them working together again! After frisbee, we moved on to our jump rope unit, which has been a huge success! I've been challenging students to see how many jumps they can do in a row. If they reach a certain number, they get to write their name on a poster displayed in the gym for everyone to see. We've also been practicing jump rope tricks like the crisscross and double side swing. Once students felt comfortable with individual challenges, we moved on to two-person jump rope challenges.

In these, two students turn the rope while the rest of the class lines up outside. The students had to time the rope just right to run through it successfully.
