## West Elementary BOE Report from Mrs. Flinn:

#### January 3 Professional Development:

The West Elementary Team had a highly productive day of professional development on **Friday, January 3**. We started with a K-5 ELA Committee meeting and completed the following:

- We are recommending to the DLT that we adopt DLI (Daily Language Instruction) at the 3-5 level to replace the grammar and spelling component in CKLA. We hope to get materials ordered quickly upon approval so that we can begin DLI instruction SECOND SEMESTER. We will need to talk in BLT about how we plan to grade these items and if we want to bring back a separate Spelling grade on our grade card at West. We will not compromise the fidelity of CKLA with the exception of replacing the grammar and spelling component which we have found to be lacking in terms of rigor, quality, and standards alignment.
- Each grade level team needs to be using the following two documents to determine what standards are taught and to what level in CKLA STARTING IMMEDIATELY. Go to Amplify; CKLA and access the Teacher Planner. Here, you will find the Standards Alignment Chart and the Standards Checklist that you will use in tandem to demonstrate the Standards taught and the extent they are taught at the end of each week (you will do this during Early Release PLC Teaming time). You'll be able to get through all of the units taught second semester and will pick back up in the fall to do the same for first semester.
- Please be sure to track this, as I do want a copy of these documents for each grade level at the end of the year and at the end of first semester for 2025. ELA reps for your grade level can answer any questions - Jenn Blume, Sara Greene, Molly Townsend.

The remainder of the day was spent working in PLC Teams and as a building PLC. Our Building PLC meeting was very full and productive, but we were unable to finish all of our tasks, so we will be moving everything unfinished to our **February 5** faculty meeting. 
# Fourth Grade Classroom Gift of the Day:

Each grade level showed a significant increase of fluent readers.

Using FastBridge aReading assessment data to measure broad reading skills, we are pleased with the number of students currently meeting or exceeding grade-level expectations. Although there are still areas to improve, we are seeing a percentile decrease in our Tier 3 students overall. This is extremely encouraging.

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#### Instructional Coaching with Dr. Allyson Lyman of Greenbush

We will again be partnering with K-State to host Early Field Experience students and Block B students (literacy block). This is a great opportunity to support future teachers, provide additional human resources to our students/staff, and recruit future teachers for our district. We hosted numerous EFE students in the fall and they did a wonderful job!
